Honorable Legislators:

Voting is the central civic act of our nation. Throughout our county and others, chronically low voter registration is a blight on our communities, especially for our youth.

While we in Monroe County sit above the national average for general voter registration, there is still work to be done. Specifically, our youth (those aged 18-24) lag behind older demographics in registration, and sit below the youth national average. Voter registration is necessary to vote, and weaker registration numbers equals worse engagement in democracy. Voter engagement in our county bears out to roughly 41%. It is imperative we make that number rise, especially for our youth.

This Bill, H.R.8192/S.4211, sponsored by Representative Frederica S. Wilson and Senator Laphonza R. Butler, will amend USC-§20506 to designate all public high schools as voter registration agencies. This would place the necessary resources for quick and easy registration at the next generation's fingertips. It is well understood that our youth have fewer resources to travel to and seek out voter registration, and as a remedy, this bill removes the barriers that keep many from engaging with the civic process.

The natural next step in voting rights is making voter registration ubiquitous, and that starts with this bill. Not only does this bill create thousands more voter registration zones, but it also mandates that public high schools run voter registration drives annually. These drives are an integral piece of this bill, as they target an unregistered population (those who have just come of age to register to vote), and are therefore primed to make a large impact.

The way to secure our future is to secure the right to vote, for now and for coming generations. When we do that, we perform a great service to both our community, and the Constitution. We encourage the members of the House of Representatives and the Senate to empower our youth and pass this bill. We also implore President Biden to bolster our rights, and sign it into law.

Honorable Legislators:

Transitioning from active duty to civilian life has been notably difficult for our veterans. Companies often have difficulty recognizing the value of the skills veterans gain while serving. While it is true that the skill set veterans possess may not be suitable for all jobs, the discrimination they face is disproportionate. Research has found that employers are generally favorable towards hiring veterans. However, their concerns and biases often interfere with this intention. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the veteran unemployment rate was 3.5% in 2022, down from 6.5% in 2020, but certain veteran demographics, such as younger veterans, still face higher unemployment rates. Despite this improvement, veterans still face significant challenges adjusting to regular society.

The Hire a Vet Grant Program would encourage public employers to hire veterans. This program would help veterans assimilate back into civilian society and honor their service. As President Lincoln said, "To care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphan," reflecting the country's dedication to caring for our veterans after their service. Although grant programs should not be necessary to encourage employers to hire veterans, societal priorities often favor different skills and traits than those veterans offer. The Pew Research Center reports that 31% of veterans say they have had trouble paying their bills, and 27% have borrowed money from friends or family in the past year. Veteran unemployment rates remain a contentious issue, with many employed veterans still living at or below the poverty line. Obtaining a job with a county, city, town, village, or school district can provide veterans with a good chance of employment shortly after leaving the military.

Here in Monroe County, we are blessed to be home to so many veterans. This Act can significantly improve the lives of veterans in Monroe County and further our recognition and gratitude towards their service to our country. Veterans possess a range of valuable skills, including leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving, which are highly transferable to civilian jobs. However, a study by the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) found that 68% of employers recognize the difficulty in translating military skills to civilian job requirements. The passing of bills S04060/A02285 by the New York State Senate and the

Assembly is a crucial step in supporting veterans in New York. These bills, once signed into law by Governor Kathy Hochul, would provide veterans with the assurance of employment and a fulfilling life after their service. By decreasing the unemployment rate for veterans in New York, these bills also aim to prevent veterans from falling into the "working poor" category of living at or below the poverty line.

Hiring veterans not only benefits the veterans themselves but also strengthens the community. Veterans bring discipline, a strong work ethic, and a sense of duty to their roles, contributing to the overall productivity and morale of the workplace. Programs like the Hire a Vet Grant Program align with federal initiatives such as the Department of Veterans Affairs' Veterans Employment Program, which provides resources and support to help veterans transition to civilian employment.

Memorializing the Governor Kathy to Veto A01489/S967A, An Act to Amend the Real Property Tax Law, in Relation to Delinquent Tax Interest Rates

Honorable Legislators:

As elected officials, we have a duty to our constituents to aid them wherever possible. To do so, we often amend tax laws to provide necessary relief to homeowners and residents. Recently passed by both the State Assembly and the State Senate, bills A01489/S967A are legislation born out of good intentions – yet it could negatively impact both our taxpayers and municipal governments statewide through unintended consequences. This proposed bill seeks to tie the current interest rate for delinquent tax payments on real property to the prime interest rate, setting a minimum rate at two percent and an interest rate ceiling of sixteen percent. The purpose of this bill is to help residential property owners who have fallen behind on their taxes and are having a challenging time resolving their delinquency due to extremely high rates charged by municipalities across the State of New York. Under the current law, the lowest possible rate a municipality can charge is twelve percent, which hasn't changed since 1983.

While the concerns of our taxpayers come first and foremost, when amending tax law, we must take into account the capabilities of our municipalities in handling these sudden changes. This new legislation has the potential to become a complex issue for both property owners and tax assessors. Furthermore, potential errors and confusion can arise due to the need to update parcels each tax cycle. This creates an added expense for municipalities and opens the door to errors in property identification. By introducing separate interest rates based on the type of property, municipalities will need to adopt a new system to manage properties not covered by this amendment (vacant and abandoned), as well as residential property – requiring time to implement and develop at the cost of the municipalities.

Tying the interest rate to the prime rate every five years might seem like an effective way to combat inflation and protect property owners, this amendment would make it challenging for homeowners to determine their economic reality and further confuse them when the rate changes. The frequent updates to parcels each tax cycle could result in errors and confusion, both for municipal tax assessors and property owners, increasing the likelihood of mistakes and misunderstandings. Municipalities, in turn, would face a loss in tax revenue from this amendment, necessitating either tax levies to be increased, services to be reduced, or funds to be borrowed with a Tax Anticipation Note. Programs to support essential services may be

compromised due to reduced funding, adversely affecting our communities. By amending the tax code in this way, we place the burden of delinquent taxpayers down the line to those who pay on time.

Additionally, the administrative burden on municipalities will increase significantly. Municipalities will face increased administrative burdens and costs in updating their systems to handle varying interest rates for different property types. This could lead to significant implementation costs and operational challenges, diverting resources from other critical areas.

Please join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul to veto this amendment to the real property tax law to avoid confusion and inefficiency for property owners and municipal tax assessors across New York State. While this amendment comes in good spirit, the broader implications will prove harmful for tax compliance, create fiscal challenges for municipalities, and further confuse and burden the taxpayers.

House Bill H.R. 8992 "Stop Fentanyl at the Border Act"

Honorable Legislators:

The opioid crisis has long afflicted neighborhoods and communities across the United States. Opioids kill an average of 70,000 Americans each year and are one of the leading causes of death among young adults. These drugs are often smuggled into the United States through points of entry (POE) along the southern border with Mexico. Of the fentanyl seized at the border, the vast majority, roughly 90 percent, were seized at POEs. In July 2023 alone, the Office of Field Operations (OFO) processed over 16.5 million pedestrians, passenger vehicles, and cargo trucks along the southern border, seizing over 176,000 pounds of illicit drugs. Between 2019 and 2023, fentanyl seizures increased by 860%, doubling between 2022 and 2023. Our CBP and Border Patrol agents work long hours and need as many resources as possible to mitigate the effects of these deadly opioids, which kill 150 Americans every day.

Last year, 81,083 Americans died from overdoses, marking the first decrease in deaths since 2018, down from 84,181 in 2022. This decline provides hope that recent border legislation passed by Congress, such as the FEND Off Fentanyl Act and the INTERDICT Act, has produced some results – but one lost life is too many. In New York State, 3,487 overdose deaths were reported, according to the CDC. Monroe County's most recent data shows that 333 opioid overdose deaths occurred in 2022, with 97.9% involving the presence of fentanyl. Just two milligrams of fentanyl, equivalent to a few grains of sand, is a lethal dose.

The Stop Fentanyl at the Border Act aims to reduce the flow of fentanyl into the U.S. and crack down on crime by providing much-needed funding, technology, and staffing increases at ports of entry along the border. This bill would enable law enforcement officers to significantly expand the capacity for scanning vehicles and cargo to detect contraband before it enters the country, cut off access to supplies that dangerous drug cartels use to commit violence and crime, and prevent illicit fentanyl and other drugs from entering the U.S. and harming American communities. Additionally, the bill would appropriate \$5.3 billion in funding to hire law enforcement, expand bonuses for CBP personnel and border patrol agents, support the deployment of Non-Intrusive Inspection Systems (NII), and create a structured outbound inspection program to increase the seizure of firearms and currency.

Memorializing the United States Congress to Amend the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act to Allow for Display of Unclaimed

Artifacts

Honorable Legislators:

Artifact display and education are the primary purposes of many museums throughout the country. The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) was passed in 1990. Its stated mission was to "provide for the protection of Native American graves" and "address the rights of lineal descendants, Indian tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations to Native American cultural items, including human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony." New regulations relating to NAGPRA call for all objects of Native American origin to remain undisclosed to non-card-carrying Native Americans and non-Native Americans without the express permission of a tribe that has demonstrated a preponderance of evidence that they were the origin of the object.

These regulations present a multi-layered problem. The first issue is the public's education. Allowing unclaimed artifacts to be viewed would create a balance between respecting ownership and the public interest in learning. Second is the issue of ownership itself. As it currently stands, few people can see objects, specifically card-carrying Native Americans who expressly request to do so. By displaying unclaimed artifacts, all people- everyday card-carrying Native Americans, non-card carrying Native Americans, and non-Native Americans alike- could potentially help determine the origin of artifacts while at the same time appreciating their historical and cultural significance. Finally, there is the issue of the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment, where "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion." Burial is an inherently religious ceremony. According to anthropology professor Elizabeth Weiss and attorney James Springer in their book *Repatriation and Erasing the Past*, by providing favor to Native American graves, Congress is violating the Establishment Clause through NAGPRA. Should NAGPRA be amended to loosen restrictions on viewership, this potentially unconstitutional provision would be removed.

While it must be acknowledged that some items were acquired unscrupulously, a vast majority are in the possession of museums and other educational institutions for good reasons. If

a tribe makes a valid claim to an item, it should be returned like any other item to which somebody makes a verified claim of ownership. However, the public benefit of education through the display of artifacts and other culturally significant items is a fundamental mechanism in teaching the history of Native Americans to people who want to learn about it.

Therefore, I ask that you join me in calling on the United States Congress to amend the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act to allow the display of unclaimed artifacts.

Honorable Legislators:

New York State Real Property Tax Law § 487 provides exemptions from taxation for certain energy systems, including solar, wind, farm waste, and micro-hydroelectric energy systems. Under subsection (8), municipalities may, by local law, remove this exemption; recently, Onondaga and Ontario Counties have done so. While well-meaning in its promotion of renewable energy, this law leads to significant revenue loss for local municipalities. By removing the exemption, Monroe County would ensure that all properties are taxed fairly, thus maintaining a stable revenue stream essential for funding local services, infrastructure, and more. This removal could help prevent the financial strain that tax exemptions might impose on the County's budget, particularly in the face of the increasing demand for and cost of public services.

Furthermore, opting out of this exemption could encourage a more balanced approach to renewable energy development. While promoting sustainability is crucial, ensuring that all property owners contribute to the local tax base is equally important. The current exemption may inadvertently create disparities, benefiting property owners with renewable energy systems at the expense of those without such installations. By opting out, Monroe County would provide a fairer environment where all property owners contribute equitably to the community's financial standing, regardless of their energy choices.

Opting out of Real Property Tax Law § 487 would allow Monroe County to prioritize equitable tax policies for all residents and allow the County to avoid shifting tax burdens to homeowners who do not benefit from the current renewable energy installation exemption. By maintaining a more balanced tax structure, Monroe County can foster community-wide support for sustainable initiatives while preserving essential public services and infrastructure.

The specific legislative actions required are to:

- 1) Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law
- 2) Enact a Local Law entitled "Opting Out of the Exemption from Taxation for Certain Energy Systems under Real Property Tax Law Section 487"

This action will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

We recommend that this matter to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "OPTING OUT OF THE EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION FOR CERTAIN ENERGY SYSTEMS UNDER REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW SECTION 487"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Purpose and Intent. Real Property Tax Law (RPTL) § 487 provides that a solar or wind energy system, farm waste energy system, micro-hydroelectric energy system, fuel cell electric generating system, micro-combined heat and power generating equipment system, electric energy storage equipment and electric energy storage system, or fuel-flexible linear generator electric generating system shall be exempt from real property taxation to the extent of any increase in the value thereof by reason of the inclusion of such energy system. This local law is enacted to opt out of and remove said exemption, as provided for by RPTL § 487(8).

Section 2. Removal of Exemption.

- 1. No tax exemption under RPTL § 487 shall be applicable to Monroe County real property taxes with respect to any solar or wind energy system or farm waste energy system which began construction subsequent to the effective date of this local law.
- 2. No tax exemption under RPTL § 487 shall be applicable to Monroe County taxes with respect to any micro-hydroelectric energy system, fuel cell electric generating system, micro-combined heat and power generating equipment system, electric energy storage equipment or electric energy storage system, or fuel flexible linear generator electric generating system constructed subsequent to the effective date of this local law.
- 3. As defined in RPTL § 487(8)(b), "construction" of a solar or wind energy system or a farm waste energy system shall be deemed to have begun upon the full execution of a contract or interconnection agreement with a utility; provided however, that if such contract or interconnection agreement requires a deposit to be made, then construction shall be deemed to have begun when the contract or interconnection agreement is fully executed and the deposit is made. The owner or developer of an energy system is responsible for substantiating when such energy system began construction or was constructed.

Section 3. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

Section 4. A copy of this local law shall be filed with the Commissioner of the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance and with the President of the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority.

Section 5. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 282 of 2018 to provide an increase in funding in the amount of \$3,000,000 for the Airport Building Improvements Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport.

The Airport Building Improvements Project provides necessary improvements to airport buildings to maintain the required level of service and building code compliance. Many buildings have been constructed or obtained as part of property acquisitions for aviation purposes on the airport property over the past 20 years and need to be renovated to replace components and facilities that have reached the end of their useful life.

The present United States Customs and Border Protection facility located in the Airport Terminal was constructed over 25 years ago and does not meet current space regulations and requirements now mandated for all United States Customs and Border Protection facilities. A new location in an existing airport building will satisfy these new regulations and also permit cargo and general aviation aircraft requiring Customs and Border Protection services to park in close proximity to the new facility.

This project will be funded by a Federal Aviation Administration grant of approximately 30%, a New York State Department of Transportation grant of 5%, and a local share of approximately 65%.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2024 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Airport Building Improvements Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport in the amount of \$3,000,000 from \$2,250,000 to \$5,250,000, for a total project authorization of \$5,250,000.
- 2. Amend Bond Resolution 282 of 2018 to increase financing for the Airport Building Improvements Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport, capital fund 1829, in the amount of \$3,000,000 from \$2,250,000 to \$5,250,000, for a total project authorization of \$5,250,000.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 406 of 2023 to provide an increase in funding in the amount of \$2,000,000 for the Airport Safety and Security Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport.

The Airport Safety and Security Project allows the Airport to maintain all elements of security at the Airport to the standards required by various federal agencies with security oversight for airports. These improvements include updated technology, repositioning security technology throughout the Airport property, updates to monitoring systems including cameras, new perimeter fence segments on the eight mile airfield perimeter, and other work that might be required.

The Airport is required to provide control of access to the property by the U. S. Department of Homeland Security. Security regulations are continually updated which require immediate action by the Airport.

This project will be funded by a Federal Aviation Administration grant of approximately 90%, a New York State Department of Transportation grant of 5%, and a local share of approximately 5%.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2024 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Airport Safety and Security Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport in the amount of \$2,000,000 from \$1,800,000 to \$3,800,000, for a total project authorization of \$3,800,000.
- 2. Amend Bond Resolution 406 of 2023 to increase financing for the Airport Safety and Security Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport, capital fund 1944, in the amount of \$2,000,000 from \$1,800,000 to \$3,800,000, for a total project authorization of \$3,800,000.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with ICC Community Development Solutions, LLC for a NYS Uniform Code Enforcement Software Solution in the amount of \$64,645 for the period of July 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025, with the option to renew for three (3) additional one year terms, with each additional term in an annual amount not to exceed \$25,000.

ICC Community Development Solutions, LLC will provide a software solution to the Department of Environmental Services ("DES") for the administration of the NYS Uniform Code in accordance with Local Law No. 1 of 2024, as adopted by Your Honorable Body. The New York State Department of State has specific and rigid record keeping, program review, and reporting requirements that will be effectively maintained with this software solution. The software will allow DES's Code Enforcement Officers to issue, monitor, and archive documents such as building permits, operating permits, annual inspections, and condition assessments.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with Villager Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$6,598,000 for general construction and Invictus Electrical, LLC in the amount of \$427,000 for electrical construction for the Genesee Valley Pump Station Project.

The Genesee Valley Pump Station Project will provide relief to the Rochester Pure Waters District's ("District") Wilson Boulevard trunk sewer and restore capacity in the Districts' collection system. Additionally, this project will allow the University of Rochester ("UR") to expand its emergency medical facilities and permit future development in the Wilson Boulevard trunk sewer's sewershed south of the UR Medical Center. The improvements will include a new 3.5 million gallon per day sanitary sewer pump station and force main consisting of a diversion and wet well structure with submersible pumps; valve and meter vaults; a small building to house electrical, instrumentation, and control components; and a 1,500± linear feet force main that will cross under the Genesee River approximately 900 feet south of Elmwood Avenue. By Resolution 294 of 2021, Your Honorable Body approved contracts with MRB Group for professional engineering services and with the UR for financial participation in and the conveyance of interest in real property for the Project. LOCAL LAW NO. ___ OF 2024

ENACT A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 286 OF THE GENERAL LOCAL LAWS OF MONROE COUNTY ENTITLED "JUNIOR DEER HUNTING PILOT PROGRAM"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 286 of the General Local Laws of Monroe County is hereby amended as follows:

- Legislative intent. The intent of this Local Law is to authorize Monroe County to permit 12- and 13-year-old individuals to participate in the new hunting opportunities pursuant to Environment Conservation Law § 11-0935. The enacted 2021-2022 New York State Budget included a pilot program expanding the opportunity for young hunters, aged 12 and/or 13, to hunt with firearms and crossbow through 2023 if a County authorizes such participation in the pilot program within their municipality via local law and this provision was later extended through 2025. Monroe County's hunters are a large and important part of our community and this opportunity would allow adult hunters the ability to introduce and teach the proper values and ethics of hunting to the next generation. In addition, teaching such safe, proper and lawful hunting methods to young people will provide a rewarding and productive experience while providing food to families across the area and contributing to deer population control efforts.
- § 286-3 Authorizing pilot program in Monroe County. Pursuant to Section 11-0935 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law, Monroe County hereby authorizes participation in the temporary pilot program to allow a hunting license holder who is twelve or thirteen years of age to hunt deer with a crossbow, rifle, shotgun, or muzzle-loading firearm through 2023 2025.
- Section 2. The Clerk of the Legislature shall notify the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation upon final adoption of this local law in accordance with Section 11-0935 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law.
- Section 3. This local law shall take effect after filing with the Secretary of State pursuant to Section 27 of New York Municipal Home Rule Law.

- f. Center for Youth Services, Inc.-Prevention Education & Prevention Counseling Program \$112,738
 The Prevention Education and Prevention Counseling Program bring comprehensive youth services to youth and their families throughout Monroe County and the City of Rochester as well as at school-based sites. Prevention/education groups and workshops, crisis intervention, counseling, case coordination, access to runaway/homeless youth housing and follow-up services are provided.
- 2. Compeer Rochester Inc.- Youth and Family Mentoring Program

 This program provides support and guidance to disadvantaged youth and their families who are struggling with poverty, mental illness and/or parental incarceration. They do this by matching youth with adult community volunteers who develop a one-on-one, trusting relationship and become a positive role model for youth.
- 3. The Urban League of Rochester, Inc. Youth Intervention Program \$27,078

 The youth intervention program provides mentoring support following the research based Behavioral Monitoring and Reinforcement Program to students at risk of being suspended or dropping out of school. The model involves regular monitoring and mentoring and student, teacher, and parent contacts. The mentoring program will provide youth achievement mentoring services and support to improve their academic, social, and emotional behavior both within the school setting and their community.
- 4. The Community Place of Greater Rochester Beacon Centers for Excellence \$46,531

 This program provides neighborhood-based after-school and summer programs to youth, ages 5-20 years and their families residing in Northeast Rochester. The program encourages the development of social and emotional competencies, assets, and the increase of protective factors with youth. Services include youth development activities such as homework assistance, leadership skills, community service and interpersonal skill building as well as intervention services within the home and school to address school or family behavioral management problems. Two evidence-based program curriculums, PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies and TOP (Teen Outreach Program) are used with the programming.
- 5. Center for Youth Services Runaway Shelter

 The Center Runaway/Homeless Youth Services is an integral component of the comprehensive package of services provided for runaway and homeless youth by The Center. Services include crisis counseling, prevention/education, short-term counseling, housing assessment, casework, and follow-up services for male and female youth through a group home shelter and volunteer families. The twelve- (12) bed shelter is open twenty-four (24) hours a day and provides short-term shelter/services in accordance with New York State Office of Children and Family Services Runaway regulations.
- 6. Charles Settlement House- READY by 21 \$25,464
 The program provides a teen club using the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program (TOP) with mentoring and engagement in community service and service-learning opportunities for NW city youth. Curricula/programming includes media literacy, employment readiness, social and emotional skill development and intergenerational programming with Charles' Senior Center.
- 7. Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative \$12,969

 The Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative seeks to solve Rochester's teen crisis by providing participants with the much-needed accountability, consistency and support necessary to overcome past obstacles and maximize their human potential. The Extreme Mentoring & Empowerment Model (EME Model) is an innovative, impactful, cost- effective and scalable solution to help teens in poverty maximize their potential. This model combines firsthand knowledge of the nuances of poverty along with an in-depth understanding of the strategic opportunities available to maximize academic and professional

success. The EME Model is built largely upon eleven programmatic principles that provide an unmatched ecosystem of collective support for each of its participants.

8. Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Rochester "Go for Gold"

\$27,970

The "Go for Gold" peer financial education program is focused on achieving self-sufficiency for at-risk youth and their families through an asset-based curriculum. The experience of working with vulnerable populations positions CCCS to make a deep and measurable impact in the Rochester community. "Go for Gold" peer educator trainings are conducted on-site at partner program locations (host sites) in conjunction with their normal program operations. Four (4) separate workshops are presented in one-hour segments using interactive, hands-on activities and demonstrations including role-play and problem-solving. Handouts and resource materials are provided at each session. Each class features education in four key areas to equip participants to deliver a 10-minute, financial workshop.

9. Villa of Hope Work Based Learning Program

\$27,970

The Villa of Hope's Work Based Learning (WBL) Program is designed to build assets by increasing personal and professional skills and preparing these youth with the knowledge and skills needed to sustain economic self-sufficiency. The WBL Program prepares youth, ages 16-20, with the skills that are necessary to obtain a sustainable wage. We will work to prepare youth to succeed in today's economy, by exposing them to high-growth middle-skill occupations in promising fields such, as manufacturing and information technology.

10. Center For Community Alternatives

\$68,466

Center for Community Alternatives is in the initial stages of developing a program that would pair youth charged with crimes (and/or coming home from detention or incarceration) to a "justice peer." Peer services are widely used in the mental health/substance use arenas and are effective. There is some movement recently to get a "justice peer" certification off the ground, for folks who, in addition to being certified as a recovery or other already-existing professional peer, happen also to have a lived experience of arrest, incarceration, etc. This will be plloted in Rochester, NY.

11. Western New York Pop Warner

\$70,000

To encourage and increase youth participation in football, cheerleading, and dance to ensure a safer, positive playing environment for all participants. In addition, instill life-long values of teamwork, dedication, and a superior work ethic in the classroom and on the playing field. This funding supports 6 different teams that play in Monroe County under the Western NY Pop Warner League.

12. ROC E6 Inc. \$16,500

Provide a variety of sports opportunities to underserved youth ages 6-17 years of age. The program will provide a consistent structure that youth can develop values, morals, and commitment through play. Our opportunities to participate in various sports programs teach fundamental values, skills, and knowledge that young people will use throughout their lives.

13. River Flow Soccer \$29,500

Provide soccer programming for City and Suburban youth ages 6-14 to break down socio-economic barriers, provide character development and the opportunity to play in a safe nurturing environment. The priority of River Flow Soccer Club is to offer children a safe place to positively engage with coaches and volunteers along with family so that they understand the community cares and values them.

14. Primetime 585 \$27,000

Provide a variety of sports opportunities to underserved youth ages 6-17 years of age. The Primetime program, events and camps will provide a consistent structure that youth can develop values, morals, and commitment through play.

15. A Horse's Friend, Inc.

25,000

Providing the opportunity for youth ages 7-17 that have social challenges or had contact with the justice system the opportunity to learn responsibility, youth development and empathy through caring for horses and learning how to ride. Expose youth to a unique sport that they would not have access to due to many accessibility challenges that exist that include cost, transportation, and awareness.

16. Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (CYAA)

\$16,000

CYAA offers youth from Rochester and Monroe County a baseball league that serves over 120 youth ages 4-12. They provide youth development, physical activity and skill development to all youth who participate.

17. Changing the Community - Life Skills Camp

\$50,000

To provide a positive, productive activity for student athletes utilizing the sport of football that will offer physical, social, and emotional development. Youth Football Camps and training program that will offer life skill, speakers' sessions and on the field skill development with local coaches and former collegiate student athletes.

Badass Bodies by Sean- (Restorative Fitness and Recreation) \$30,000

This program will offer displaced youth under the direct care and supervision of the County of Monroe, a variety of fitness and mental health activities & programs. The program will be held at a private facility that offers one on one fitness instruction. Participants will have access to typical gym and fitness equipment such as, weights and weight machines, cardio machines, a 15' trampolline, aerobic equipment, battle rope and TRX stations, a half basketball court and climbing rope.

19. Hoop 'n Holla Inc.

\$25,000

21. Roc Royal, Inc.

\$25,000

The STEP, DANCE & CHEER REVOLUTION program is a dynamic initiative designed to engage and empower youth through the art of step, cheer, and dance. This project aims to provide a platform for creative expression, physical activity, and community building among young individuals. The program will run for a duration of 12 weeks for 50 youth from ages 6-18. We would like to have this program operate during the summer months however, it can happen during the school year as well. The program is free to participate for low-income families.



22. YMCA of Greater Rochester (Love 15 Tennis Program)

The YMCAs Love 15 program is designed to provide youth of all cultural, ethnic, and gender backgrounds, in the poorest zip codes in the City of Rochester, with an opportunity to participate in an athletic program that supports their social and emotional growth and development as well as provides opportunities for competition and athletic achievement. This program will provide youth between the ages of 5 and 18 opportunities to develop life skills that will support future successes. LOVE-15 exists to encourage each individual participant to strive for personal excellence on and off the tennis court. The program offers an opportunity for participants to receive free tennis lessons provided by quality instructors. Love-15 promotes leadership, teamwork, diversity, personal ambition, and health.

23. Stars Basketball Academy - Girls Basketball

\$32,000

Shining Stars Basketball Academy program emphasizes leadership, teamwork, resilience, and academic excellence. By competing in tournaments where they are scouted by college coaches, our players can showcase their talents and pursue collegiate basketball careers. We take pride in fostering a supportive and empowering environment that equips our athletes with the skills and confidence to succeed both on and off the court, ensuring they are prepared for the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

24. International Sister Cities of Rochester, NY, Inc.

\$50,000

(Puerto-Plata-Rochester Sister Cities Youth baseball Exchange)

The project initiates an exchange of baseball teams of boys 11-14 years old between Rochester and Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic. Team athletics and cross-cultural experience will develop teamwork and leadership skills, build intercultural competency, and increase parental involvement with their children's sports activities. The Rochester team includes thirteen youth and two coaches, one chaperone parent per player and four siblings of single-parent family players. 

The project is approximately 360 feet north of 368-372 Hudson Ave and 350 feet south of 168 Weeger Street which are listed as eligible properties on the NYS Cultural Resource Information Center (CRIS). This project will not have a significant adverse impact on the National Register Eligible properties. None of the properties are adjacent to nor directly across the street from the project site.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project is near a potential and unspecified archeologically sensitive site. However, the project site has previously been developed at least as far back as 1888 and will not impact any archeological sensitive sites.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project site is near a environmental remediation site. The Former Woltensack Optical site code C828209 is approximately .7 miles north of the project site. The site classification is C indicating that the DEC has determined that remediation has been satisfactorily completed under a remedial program. The site will not be disturbed and will have no impact on the project site due to their location and remediation classification.

The surrounding area is currently zoned residential in accordance with the City's existing Comprehensive Plan. The existing land is vacant. Surrounding parcels are residential with single family homes. Accordingly, the development of new single family homes on existing residentially zoned parcels will not alter the character, intensity, environment, traffic levels, or other important historic, archaeological, or aesthetic resources. Therefore, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

Honorable Legislators:

In 2021, this Honorable Body enacted a local law pursuant to Environmental Conservation Law 11-0935 that created a Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program. Prior to the adoption of the 2021-22 New York State Budget, the minimum age for a junior hunter to hunt deer with a firearm or crossbow with adult supervision was fourteen (14). Section 11-0935 of the Environmental Conservation Law allowed counties to create pilot programs for twelve- and thirteen-year-olds and was recently extended through December 31, 2025. The Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program offers an opportunity for young outdoor enthusiasts to engage in one of New York State's most popular recreational activities. With hunting being a significant part of the state's cultural and ecological landscape, extending this program would ensure that young hunters receive the proper guidance and education from experienced adults. This would not only enhance their skills but also instill a deep respect for wildlife conservation and safety, developing a new generation of responsible hunters.

By extending the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program, we can continue to provide young hunters with invaluable hands-on experience that cannot be replicated in a classroom setting. The mentorship from seasoned hunters helps young participants learn essential skills such as tracking, patience, and ethical hunting practices. These skills are not only crucial for hunting but also teach valuable life lessons about responsibility, respect for nature, and the importance of conservation efforts.

Safety is a paramount concern, and the structured environment of the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program ensures that all participants are taught the necessary safety protocols and ethical standards. The program includes comprehensive safety measures and supervised hunting experiences, reducing the risk of accidents and promoting a culture of safety among young hunters.

Extending the program will allow more young people to learn these critical safety practices in a controlled and supportive environment.

Finally, extending the Junior Deer Hunter Pilot Program aligns with broader conservation and wildlife management goals. By fostering an appreciation for hunting and wildlife management at a young age, the program helps ensure the long-term sustainability of New York's diverse ecosystems. Participants learn about the balance between wildlife populations and their habitats and how responsible hunting practices contribute to this balance. This educational component is crucial for developing informed and conscientious hunters who will continue to support and advocate for conservation efforts throughout their lives.

The specific legislative action required is to adopt the local law as attached.

This is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environment Quality Review Act. This action will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

We recommend that this matter to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body. Because the issuance of hunting permits begins September 1, we are asking that this be declared a Matter of Importance so that it may be considered at this month's committees and approved at the August meeting of the Legislature.

Honorable Legislators:

Article 25AA Section 303-B of the NYS Agriculture and Markets law allows additions to established agricultural districts prior to the normal eight-year review date. The law also requires the county agricultural and farmland protection board to review the proposed additions to the district(s) and make recommendations on the proposal to the legislative body. Resolution number 10 of 2024 adopted by Your Honorable Body directed the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board to review and make recommendations on additions to the district(s).

Therefore, in accordance with Article 25AA, we are pleased to transmit this report concerning our review, findings, and recommendations. This report includes 1) a list of six (6) parcels from four (4) landowners. All applicants were interviewed by phone. A determination was made by the AFPB based on soil type, enterprise budget, physical structures and landowner intent as to whether or not these parcels are predominantly viable agricultural land. The following 6 parcels have been found to be viable agricultural land and are recommended by AFPB to be added to an agricultural district.

Based on telephone interviews with owners and municipal officials, analysis of USDA soil maps, and site visits, the Board has determined that all 6 parcels are comprised of predominantly viable agricultural land and inclusion of these parcels into an agricultural district would serve the public interest by assisting in maintaining a viable agricultural industry within the respective municipalities.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve the operating budget of Monroe Community College for the fiscal year September 1, 2024 through August 31, 2025 as submitted by the College.

The proposed 2024 - 2025 Monroe Community College budget has been reviewed by me, as well as the staff of the County's Office of Management and Budget. I concur with the request of the College.

The following resolution was adopted by the Monroe Community College Board of Trustees at their meeting on June 10, 2024:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Monroe Community College approves the Operating Budget for the fiscal year September 1, 2024 through August 31, 2025 in the amount of \$117,100,000.

Approval of this budget will provide funding for 7,400 state-aidable full-time equivalent students during the College fiscal year. Adoption by Your Honorable Body is required before the State University of New York can approve its share of the College budget.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing.
- 2. Approve the total Monroe Community College operating budget in the amount of \$117,100,000 and a sponsor contribution by the County of Monroe in the amount of \$21,300,000.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The approval of this budget will require an appropriation of \$21,300,000 in the County of Monroe budget year 2025 as the County sponsor contribution.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.





Revenue Sources - Highlights

The state, county sponsor, and students provide 83.8% of total funding for the operating budget.
State aid is determined by SUNY in accord with the state budget. For the 2024-2025 year, base state aid is the higher of \$2,997 per FTE or 100% of the 2023-24 SUNY approved base aid. Under the enacted funding floor, state aid amounts to \$29,921,874 or 25.6% of the total revenue budget.
Sponsor contribution amounts to \$21,300,000, an increase of \$520,000 or 2.5% over last year. This represents 18.2% of the total revenue budget.
Student tuition and fees will total \$46,853,417 or 40.0% of the total revenue budget.
Student tuition rates will increase to \$5,050 for full-time and \$210 per credit hour for part-time students. Historically, this amounts to a 2.9% average annual increase over the last 5-year period. Student tuition will fund \$37,937,546 or 32.4% of the total budget. The Technology fee will remain flat at \$325 per applicable term and will provide \$4,278,672 in student support.
Other sources of revenue totaling \$19,024,709 or 16.2% include Other Sponsored Programs, charges to other counties, interest, rental and miscellaneous revenue and use of allocated fund balance.


Monroe Community College 2024-2025 Operating Budget






2024-2025 Operating Budget Monroe Community College












Gross Budgeted Expenditures per FTE Student

- The budgeted cost per FTE of \$15,824 is \$1,192 or 7.0% below the computed SUNY average of \$17,016 for the 2024-25 year.











Amending the 2024 Salary Schedule for Flat and Hourly Employees Subject:

Honorable Legislators:

Pay equity is an important issue that many of the members of this Honorable Body have spent a significant amount of time working towards. At the root of the issue is to ensure adequate and fair compensation tied to work experience, length of tenure, educational background, job performance, and other relevant factors.

Adequate and fair compensation are also essential components to staff retention. The Legislature has seen significant turnover over the last few years, including changes in the Chief of Staff in both Caucus offices and significant numbers of departures from other staff positions. The reasons cited by departing staff all-too-often include better pay opportunities and greater opportunities for career advancement. In addition, Monroe County is one of the few counties in New York where Majority Staff pay scales are higher than Minority Staff. In fact, in two other peer counties, Albany and Erie Counties, the Minority Chief of Staff receives higher pay than the Majority Chief of Staff according to their 2024 budgets. The difference is in part due to differences in professional experience and tenure. Pay equity is difficult to achieve, even when warranted by an individual's knowledge and experience, this would be difficult to do in Monroe County without structural changes such as this.

The proposed resolution remedies the pay scale disparities between the Democratic and Republican Legislative offices, raises pay for some titles to meet recruitment needs, and adjusts pay for equivalent level titles.

The specific legislative action(s) required are:

1. Adopt the Amendments to Flat and Hourly Pay Rates in Attachment A

This legislative action requested in the referral is not an "Action," as that term is defined in 6 NYCRR § 617.2 (b), and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act. This amendment will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Ultramobile Imaging, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$160,000 to provide radiology services for residents at Monroe Community Hospital ("MCH") and patients of the Monroe County Department of Public Health ("DPH") Tuberculosis ("TB") Control Program for the period of October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025, with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms in an amount not to exceed \$160,000 per year.

The residents of MCH benefit from on-site exams and procedures, rather than transferring out of the building to another service provider. Radiology services to be provided to MCH include routine x-ray examinations, ultrasounds, vascular imaging, carotid imaging, and echocardiography. Most exams are scheduled approximately 24 hours in advance; however, there is a requirement for STAT procedures 24-hours/day, 7-days/week. The vendor will provide and use state-of-the-art equipment, transport that equipment to and from MCH, and set up and dismantle that equipment for on-site services.

Additionally, patients of DPH's TB clinic benefit from the provision of on-site radiology. DPH's TB Control Program provides radiological services to diagnose and monitor the effectiveness of treatment for individuals who have TB infection. Radiology services provided to TB clinic patients including routine chest x-ray examinations, as well as x-rays of other body parts as clinically indicated.

A Request for Proposals was issued for this contract and Ultramobile Imaging, Inc. was selected as the most qualified to provide this service.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 155 of 2018 to expand the eligible priority geographic area and extend the time period of the grant from the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation for the State Septic System Replacement Program through March 31, 2027.

The purpose of this grant is to provide Monroe County property owners with reimbursement of up to fifty percent (50%) of eligible costs, up to a maximum of \$10,000, incurred for eligible septic system replacement projects. In order to be eligible, the septic system is required to be in need of replacement or upgrade, and must be located within 250 feet of a water body designated in the eligible priority geographic area by the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation. This grant helps to provide the means to fix systems located near sensitive water bodies, thereby helping enhance water quality in Monroe County. Funds will be used to reimburse eligible property owners. The property owners will not receive the grant until after they have met eligibility requirements and the work is completed.

The New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation has begun Round 4 of the State Septic System Replacement Program. This both extends the time period of the grant through March 31, 2027 and expands the eligible priority geographic area to include Rochester Embayment West (0301-0068), Lake Ontario Shoreline Western (0301-0069), Lake Ontario Shoreline Western (0301-0070), Irondequoit Bay (0302-0001), Rochester Embayment East (0302-0002), Mill Creek and tributaries (0302-0025), Shipbuilders Creek and tributaries (0302-0026), Hundred Acre Pond (0302-0034), minor tributaries to Irondequoit Bay (0302-0038), and Lake Ontario Shoreline Central (0302-0045).

Intermunicipal Agreements for the Tobacco Enforcement Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a five-year grant from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$979,250 and authorize intermunicipal agreements with those listed below in a total amount not to exceed \$89,890 annually for the Tobacco Enforcement Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2029.

The purpose of this grant is to prevent the sale of tobacco and vapor products to individuals under the age of 21. This project involves the participation of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, City of Rochester Police Department, and the Towns of Brighton, Gates, Greece, Irondequoit, Ogden, and Webster, and includes compliance investigation, public information, education, and enforcement components. This will be the twenty-ninth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding level represents an increase of \$37,058 from the previous twelve month period.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$979,250 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health for the Tobacco Enforcement Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2029.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$195,850 into general fund 9300, funds center 5806010000, Environmental Health Administration.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, with the City of Rochester, the Towns of Brighton, Gates, Greece, Irondequoit, Ogden, and Webster, and other municipalities as necessary for the Tobacco Enforcement Program in a total amount not to exceed \$89,890 annually for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2029.

- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Acceptance of Additional Funding from the New York State Office of Children and Family Services and Amend Resolution 473 of 2023 Authorizing Contracts with Not-For-Profit Agencies for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs in 2024

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Children and Family Services in the amount of \$10,344 and amend Resolution 473 of 2023 authorizing contracts with the agencies listed in the updated Attachment A from a total amount not to exceed \$1,296,835 to a total amount not to exceed \$1,338,575 for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024.

This additional funding will be used by the Department of Human Services, Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau, to provide one-time investments in infrastructure for physical activity. Examples include improvements to sports fields or courts, building a storage unit to maintain equipment, the purchase of sporting equipment or uniforms, or similar costs.

The agencies were selected through a competitive expression of interest process, based on the New York State required County Child and Family Services Plan in which services to be contracted must directly correspond to the assessed needs, priority focus areas, and outcomes of the plan; State Executive Law procedures and criteria for selecting programs; and State certification requirements for runaway and homeless shelter programs. Contracted servicers directly correspond to the assessed needs and service objectives of the Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau and as required and approved by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept an additional \$10,344 from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services for Rochester-Monroe County Youth Bureau Programs in 2024 for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Monroe County Youth Bureau, by appropriating the sum of \$10,344 into general fund 9001, funds center 5606019300, Positive Youth Development.

- 3. Amend Resolution 473 of 2023 to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with each approved agency as listed in the updated Attachment A for youth services from a total amount not to exceed \$1,296,835 to a total amount not to exceed \$1,338,575 for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute any applications, contracts, and amendments thereto, with New York State and/or agencies listed in Attachment A to increase or decrease the contract amount and extend the length of the contract(s) in order to maximize state reimbursements for these purposes.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by New York State Office of Children and Family Services. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit status and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

ATTACHMENT A PRIVATE AGENCY CONTRACTS 2024

2. Compeer Rochester Inc.- Youth and Family Mentoring Program

\$23,274

This program provides support and guidance to disadvantaged youth and their families who are struggling with poverty, mental illness and/or parental incarceration. They do this by matching youth with adult community volunteers who develop a one-on-one, trusting relationship and become a positive role model for youth.

3. The Urban League of Rochester, Inc. - Youth Intervention Program

\$27,078

The youth intervention program provides mentoring support following the research based Behavioral Monitoring and Reinforcement Program to students at risk of being suspended or dropping out of school. The model involves regular monitoring and mentoring and student, teacher, and parent contacts. The mentoring program will provide youth achievement mentoring services and support to improve their academic, social, and emotional behavior both within the school setting and their community.

4. The Community Place of Greater Rochester - Beacon Centers for Excellence

\$46,531

This program provides neighborhood-based after-school and summer programs to youth, ages 5-20 years and their families residing in Northeast Rochester. The program encourages the development of social and emotional competencies, assets, and the increase of protective factors with youth. Services include youth development activities such as homework assistance, leadership skills, community service and interpersonal skill building as well as intervention services within the home and school to address school or family behavioral management problems. Two evidence-based program curriculums, PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies and TOP (Teen Outreach Program) are used with the programming.

5. Center for Youth Services – Runaway Shelter

\$449,502

The Center Runaway/Homeless Youth Services is an integral component of the comprehensive package of services provided for runaway and homeless youth by The Center. Services include crisis counseling, prevention/education, short-term counseling, housing assessment, casework, and follow-up services for male and female youth through a group home shelter and volunteer families. The twelve- (12) bed shelter is open twenty-four (24) hours a day and provides short-term shelter/services in accordance with New York State Office of Children and Family Services Runaway regulations.

6. Charles Settlement House-READY by 21

\$25,464

The program provides a teen club using the evidence-based Teen Outreach Program (TOP) with mentoring and engagement in community service and service-learning opportunities for NW city youth. Curricula/programming includes media literacy, employment readiness, social and emotional skill development and intergenerational programming with Charles' Senior Center.

Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative

\$12,969

The Champion Academy Extreme Mentoring and Empowerment Initiative seeks to solve Rochester's teen crisis by providing participants with the much-needed accountability, consistency and support necessary to overcome past obstacles and maximize their human potential. The Extreme Mentoring & Empowerment Model (EME Model) is an innovative, impactful, cost- effective and scalable solution to help teens in poverty maximize their potential. This model combines firsthand knowledge of the nuances of poverty along with an in-depth understanding of the strategic opportunities available to maximize academic and professional

success. The EME Model is built largely upon eleven programmatic principles that provide an unmatched ecosystem of collective support for each of its participants.

8. Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Rochester "Go for Gold"

\$27,970

The "Go for Gold" peer financial education program is focused on achieving self-sufficiency for at-risk youth and their families through an asset-based curriculum. The experience of working with vulnerable populations positions CCCS to make a deep and measurable impact in the Rochester community. "Go for Gold" peer educator trainings are conducted on-site at partner program locations (host sites) in conjunction with their normal program operations. Four (4) separate workshops are presented in one-hour segments using interactive, hands-on activities and demonstrations including role-play and problem-solving. Handouts and resource materials are provided at each session. Each class features education in four key areas to equip participants to deliver a 10-minute, financial workshop.

9. Villa of Hope Work Based Learning Program

\$27,970

The Villa of Hope's Work Based Learning (WBL) Program is designed to build assets by increasing personal and professional skills and preparing these youth with the knowledge and skills needed to sustain economic self-sufficiency. The WBL Program prepares youth, ages 16-20, with the skills that are necessary to obtain a sustainable wage. We will work to prepare youth to succeed in today's economy, by exposing them to high-growth middle-skill occupations in promising fields such, as manufacturing and information technology.

10. Center For Community Alternatives

\$68,466

Center for Community Alternatives is in the initial stages of developing a program that would pair youth charged with crimes (and/or coming home from detention or incarceration) to a "justice peer." Peer services are widely used in the mental health/substance use arenas and are effective. There is some movement recently to get a "justice peer" certification off the ground, for folks who, in addition to being certified as a recovery or other already-existing professional peer, happen also to have a lived experience of arrest, incarceration, etc. This will be piloted in Rochester, NY.

11. Western New York Pop Warner

\$70,000

To encourage and increase youth participation in football, cheerleading, and dance to ensure a safer, positive playing environment for all participants. In addition, instill life-long values of teamwork, dedication, and a superior work ethic in the classroom and on the playing field. This funding supports 6 different teams that play in Monroe County under the Western NY Pop Warner League.

12. ROC E6 Inc. \$16,500

Provide a variety of sports opportunities to underserved youth ages 6-17 years of age. The program will provide a consistent structure that youth can develop values, morals, and commitment through play. Our opportunities to participate in various sports programs teach fundamental values, skills, and knowledge that young people will use throughout their lives.

13. River Flow Soccer \$29,500

Provide soccer programming for City and Suburban youth ages 6-14 to break down socio-economic barriers, provide character development and the opportunity to play in a safe nurturing environment. The priority of River Flow Soccer Club is to offer children a safe place to positively engage with coaches and volunteers along with family so that they understand the community cares and values them.

14. Primetime 585 \$27,000

Provide a variety of sports opportunities to underserved youth ages 6-17 years of age. The Primetime program, events and camps will provide a consistent structure that youth can develop values, morals, and commitment through play.

15. A Horse's Friend, Inc.

\$25,000

Providing the opportunity for youth ages 7-17 that have social challenges or had contact with the justice system the opportunity to learn responsibility, youth development and empathy through caring for horses and learning how to ride. Expose youth to a unique sport that they would not have access to due to many accessibility challenges that exist that include cost, transportation, and awareness.

16. Charlotte Youth Athletic Association (CYAA)

\$16,000

CYAA offers youth from Rochester and Monroe County a baseball league that serves over 120 youth ages 4-12. They provide youth development, physical activity and skill development to all youth who participate.

17. Changing the Community - Life Skills Camp

\$50,000

To provide a positive, productive activity for student athletes utilizing the sport of football that will offer physical, social, and emotional development. Youth Football Camps and training program that will offer life skill, speakers' sessions and on the field skill development with local coaches and former collegiate student athletes.

18. Badass Bodies by Sean- (Restorative Fitness and Recreation) \$30,000

This program will offer displaced youth under the direct care and supervision of the County of Monroe, a variety of fitness and mental health activities & programs. The program will be held at a private facility that offers one on one fitness instruction. Participants will have access to typical gym and fitness equipment such as, weights and weight machines, cardio machines, a 15' trampoline, aerobic equipment, battle rope and TRX stations, a half basketball court and climbing rope.

19. Hoop 'n Holla Inc.

\$25,000

Hoop 'n Holla basketball camp is designed to build on the basketball hopes and dreams of our Monroe County youth, ages 6-17, utilizing an interactive village where all campers learn the fundamental skills, mechanics, and thinking strategies associated with successful execution of basketball. Our full-day program combines social, emotional and nutritional elements into an educational framework that illustrates how ELA, Mathematics, Financial Literacy, Emotional Well Being and Nutrition are inextricably connected to academic and basketball athletic opportunities. Additionally, each class is aligned with NYS Educational Common Core Standards, highlighting one of our fundamental values, decreasing summer leaning loss.

20. The Warrior Factory Rochester (Summer Agillty Ninja Rec League)

\$10,800

Participants will compete in a Summer Ninja Rec League that includes an individual obstacle course race and a team relay during weekly matches. The season will begin with open play attendance and an opportunity for youth to build relationships with staff and gain familiarity on the equipment. The rec league season will contain multiple practices and then shift towards competition with a playoff bracket and championship. Participants will learn about positive mindset as well as develop balance, agility, upper body and grip strength. Teamwork as well as building positive relationships with others while trying new challenges will be repeated themes through the program. The Summer Ninja Rec league will run from June 11th to August 29th.

21. Roc Royal, Inc.

\$25,000

The STEP, DANCE & CHEER REVOLUTION program is a dynamic initiative designed to engage and empower youth through the art of step, cheer, and dance. This project aims to provide a platform for creative expression, physical activity, and community building among young individuals. The program will run for a duration of 12 weeks for 50 youth from ages 6-18. We would like to have this program operate during the summer months however, it can happen during the school year as well. The program is free to participate for low-income families.



22. YMCA of Greater Rochester (Love 15 Tennis Program)

The YMCAs Love 15 program is designed to provide youth of all cultural, ethnic, and gender backgrounds, in the poorest zip codes in the City of Rochester, with an opportunity to participate in an athletic program that supports their social and emotional growth and development as well as provides opportunities for competition and athletic achievement. This program will provide youth between the ages of 5 and 18 opportunities to develop life skills that will support future successes. LOVE-15 exists to encourage each individual participant to strive for personal excellence on and off the tennis court. The program offers an opportunity for participants to receive free tennis lessons provided by quality instructors. Love-15 promotes leadership, teamwork, diversity, personal ambition, and health.

23. Stars Basketball Academy - Girls Basketball

\$32,000

Shining Stars Basketball Academy program emphasizes leadership, teamwork, resilience, and academic excellence. By competing in tournaments where they are scouted by college coaches, our players can showcase their talents and pursue collegiate basketball careers. We take pride in fostering a supportive and empowering environment that equips our athletes with the skills and confidence to succeed both on and off the court, ensuring they are prepared for the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

24. International Sister Cities of Rochester, NY, inc

\$50,000

(Puerto-Plata-Rochester Sister Cities Youth baseball Exchange)

The project initiates an exchange of baseball teams of boys 11-14 years old between Rochester and Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic. Team athletics and cross-cultural experience will develop teamwork and leadership skills, build intercultural competency, and increase parental involvement with their children's sports activities. The Rochester team includes thirteen youth and two coaches, one chaperone parent per player and four siblings of single-parent family players. Activities include practices and cultural sessions in Rochester, ball games and skills training with a Puerto Plata team, a tour of the sister city, and family discussion time.

25. Future Boxing Club Inc

\$45,000

Future Boxing Club has developed a program called (TEAM) Together Everyone Achieves More. This would provide a quality after school program. The children develop a strong sense of themselves and learn how to rely on one another in a team environment. They view one another as family members, and learn how to communicate, resolve conflicts, and celebrate successes together while at the same time fighting childhood obesity. Our mission is to create healthy, confident, and successful children, through the lessons learned in physical exercise/interval training and The Art of Boxing.

26. ROC Bears Youth Football and Cheer

\$29,469

The Bears Youth Football & Cheer organization is an organization that strives to give all athletes the opportunity to play regardless of race, ethnicity, residency and ability. We strive to provide mentorship through our coaches and board members and provide a safe and structured environment for all. We model positive relationships and interactions between coaches, mentors, athletes and parents. Our program teaches values, life skills and discipline through both football and cheer. We also put a high value on a culture of family, when here everyone is family and we encourage involvement from parents, aunts, uncles, grandparents and any other positive relationships.

27. ROC E6 \$10,344

Provide a one-time investment in infrastructure for physical activity. Examples include improvements to sports fields or courts, building a storage unit to maintain equipment, the purchase of sporting equipment or uniforms, or similar costs. – The funding will assist in the building of a storage shed/vending booth for youth programs that play at their field. This will provide a safe space to store their equipment and supplies. It will also allow them to vend snack that will produce revenue to support the programs.

Deputies at Watkins Glen International

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with Schuyler County for special detail deputies at Watkins Glen International for the period of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2029.

Under this agreement, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office will provide special detail deputies to perform mutual aid police duties at Watkins Glen International upon a declaration of emergency by the Schuyler County Sheriff under Section 209-f of the New York General Municipal Law. Throughout the summer, Schuyler County reasonably anticipates crowds in excess of 20,000 people for large events at Watkins Glen International. Mutual aid is required given that the resources of the Schuyler County Sheriff's Office are unable to address crowds, traffic volume and consequences attributable to large-scale gatherings of that magnitude. The hourly payment rates vary from year to year based on contractual negotiations between Schuyler County and NASCAR. The 2024 hourly rate is currently \$38 hourly for deputies and \$40 hourly for supervisors and K9 units.

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in an amount not to exceed \$11,705,000 for the Law Enforcement Technology ("LETECH") Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2025.

The purpose of Governor Hochul's LETECH program is to support technology for law enforcement agencies who are increasingly relying on emerging technologies to perform duties and enhance public safety. The Sheriff's Office anticipates applying this funding to upgrade their bodyworn camera program, install dash cameras in some patrol vehicles, enhance a virtual reality-training program, deploy automated license plate readers and public safety cameras, develop their drone as a first responder program, as well as purchase computer hardware and related technology for the Regional Investigative Operations Center. The grant will pay the initial costs incurred by the Sheriff's Office to purchase technology. This will be the first year the County has received this grant.

The specific legislative actions required are:

Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$11,705,000, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the Law Enforcement Technology Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2025.

Per Resolution 102 of 2023, Monroe County accepted a grant from the NYSDEC in an initial amount of \$50,000 to develop an Organic Management Plan ("Plan"). The Plan will serve as an extension of the existing Monroe County local solid waste management plan as approved by the NYSDEC. The expected outcome of the Plan is to provide a set of waste management data, options, goals, and alternatives that can be used to develop an integrated plan for managing organic waste in Monroe County from various sources including residential, commercial, industrial, institutional, and agricultural.

The grant funds will also be used to increase public participation, fund greenhouse gas emissions calculations for various management alternatives, a waste characterization study and additional consultant services with Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C. under the general solid waste consulting term services contract for plan development and report preparation. Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C.'s contract for general solid waste consulting term services will be increased from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements.

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body adopt the Monroe County Climate Action Plan Phase II.

On March 10, 2020 Your Honorable Body authorized the creation of a Climate Action Plan Advisory Committee for the express purpose of creating a Climate Action Plan for Monroe County ("County") (Resolution No. 76 of 2020). This was followed by further related actions taken by Your Honorable Body to: appoint members of the Committee (Resolution No. 167 of 2020); authorize the execution of a contract with Bergmann Associates, Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects & Surveyors, D.P.C. for Professional Design Services for the Climate Action Plan (Resolution No. 425 of 2020); adopt the New York State Climate Smart Communities Resolution (Resolution No. 260 of 2020); and accept a grant from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation under the Climate Smart Communities program to support the development of the Climate Action Plan (Resolution No. 111 of 2022). On September 13, 2022, Your Honorable Body adopted the Climate Action Plan Phase I (Resolution No. 276 of 2022), that demonstrated the County's leadership in climate action by committing to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from County operations.

The Climate Action Plan Phase II focuses on community-wide climate action. Using the same baseline year of 2019 as Phase I, the greenhouse gas emissions for the entire county were calculated from all sources to be approximately 8.2 million metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent. As the Climate Action Plan is comprised of both Phase I and Phase II, the plan presents a consistent goal for reduction of greenhouse gas emissions by 80 percent by 2050. Through an extensive public engagement process, the County received comments from community stakeholders about their desires and priorities for action in six focus areas, namely: Energy Use & Consumption; Buildings & Housing; Transportation; Sustainable Materials Management; Land & Water Resources; and Partnerships, Education & Economy.

The specific legislative action required is to adopt the Monroe County Climate Action Plan Phase II.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of District Attorney Sandra Doorley and Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$2,912,458 for the District Attorney's Office, the Office of the Sheriff, and the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections for the Gun Involved Violence Elimination ("GIVE") Partnership for the period of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025.

This project provides resources enabling the Monroe County law enforcement community to target violent criminals and those possessing weapons in a coordinated effort to reduce violent crime in Monroe County. The primary goals of this partnership are to support targeted firearm and violent crime reduction efforts within Monroe County and to increase the solvability of non-fatal bullet-to-body shooting cases in the City of Rochester by working in tandem with the Rochester Police Department from the onset of each investigation. This is the eleventh year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$509 from last year.

Funds will be used specifically to help support the following programs in the following departments:

- District Attorney's Office: Supports eight (8) existing Assistant District Attorney positions (50%) assigned to prosecute violent felons and criminals possessing illegal weapons; four (4) existing Assistant District Attorney positions (1 at 90%, 3 at 100%), two (2) District Attorney Investigator positions (100%), and one (1) Victim Witness Advocate (100%) to comprehensively investigate and prosecute non-fatal bullet-to-body shootings; and provides the Boys and Girls Clubs of Rochester, Inc. with an \$8,000 sub-grant to continue its Street SMART Program.
- Sheriff's Office: Supports an existing Sheriff's Criminal Investigator (50%), Road Patrol Deputy and a Jail Deputy (100%), and underwrites part of the overtime costs of the Office of the Sheriff's participation in joint anti-crime efforts and community engagement details with the other GIVE agency partners.
- Office of Probation and Community Corrections: Supports the cost of an existing Assistant Chief Probation Officer (85%), a Probation Supervisor, two Senior Probation Officers and two Probation Officers. Additionally, it supports Cognitive Behavioral Interventions designed for high risk offenders, enhanced electronic monitoring capability, and underwrites the overtime costs of the Office of Probation and Community Correction's participation in joint anti-crime efforts with the other GIVE agency partners.

The funding amounts are as follows: \$1,458,188 for the District Attorney's Office, \$499,270 for the Office of the Sheriff, and \$955,000 for the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body appropriate assigned fund balance for authorized capital project expenditures and the local share of Medicaid Upper Payment Limit funding, in the aggregate amount of \$20,571,065, and authorize interfund transfers to various capital funds and Monroe Community Hospital.

Your Honorable Body has previously authorized bond financing for certain capital projects for which Local Financial Law establishes a period of probable usefulness of five years. For the past year and a half, however, the County has refrained from issuing bonds on these projects because (a) shorter duration borrowing has been more expensive than longer duration borrowing, and (b) the robust capital improvement program currently under consideration requires a more thoughtful and strategic approach to future debt service planning. Cash funding these five-year projects now would avoid bond issuance costs and the associated interest expense, and reduce upcoming budgetary pressures resulting from higher debt service requirements.

At the same time, the state and federal governments have yet to finalize an agreement for Medicaid Upper Payment Limit funding related to state fiscal year 2023-24. Based on recent agreements, it is estimated the Upper Payment Limit funding will be \$19.8 million. Once approved, this intergovernmental transfer program will require the County to pay to the state a 50% local share requirement before the state remits 100% of the Upper Payment Limit award to Monroe Community Hospital. The currently adopted budget, however, does not include sufficient appropriations for the County to remit two state fiscal years' (SFY 2023-24 and SFY 2024-25) worth of Medicaid Upper Payment Limit local share.

Both of the aforementioned issues can be addressed by the appropriation of assigned fund balance. The audited financial statements for fiscal year 2023 report available fund balance in excess of the fund balance policy upper limit by \$25.79 million, and the appropriations requested herewith are consistent with the policy guidance for excess fund balance of capital project funding and/or debt reduction, or for any other lawful purpose approved by the Legislature.

JEDS is an intensive supervision model through Monroe County Office of Probation and Community Corrections diversion services that relies on repetitive and temporally compact contacts with juveniles who have been arrested. The strategic use of programs and services that augment supervision helps to separate the juveniles from others engaged in criminal behavior, which better prepares them for a more traditional supervision model that addresses criminogenic issues to avoid future contact with the justice system. Parallel benefits of the JEDS program also include time-saving on the part of law enforcement, as under JEDS, Probation assumes many of the arresting agency's responsibilities in relation to custody, transportation, and detention activities.

The creation of positions within the Department of Public Safety will allow the Office of Probation to extend the "stabilization period" for each youth active with JEDS. The contact requirements (daily) during an extended stabilization period requires additional staffing.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$1,000,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the Enhancement and Expansion of the Juvenile Enhanced Diversion Stabilization Program for the period of June 1, 2024 through May 31, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$1,000,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division.

- 3. Authorize County Executive, or his designee, to create two (2) positions in the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, as follows: (1) Assistant Probation Director (Group D), pay group 20 and one (1) Senior Probation Officer, pay group 37.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the First Genesis/Rochester Management Single Family Homes Project in the City of Rochester may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves funding the construction of twenty-two (22) single-family homes in the Upper Falls neighborhood by Rochester Management Inc. (developer) and First Genesis Baptist Church (sponsor). The plans include construction of five, 2-bedroom ranch style houses (single story); six, 3-bedroom ranch homes; and 11, 3-bedroom, two-story homes (with full basement). There are currently three homes assigned as ADA compliant with built-in grab bars, roll-in shower and lower counters in the kitchen. These homes will be energy efficient, all electric, designed to complement the surrounding neighborhood and will feature front porches, storage areas, laundry hook-ups and off-street parking with a detached garage. The single-family homes will be sold to qualifying residents upon completion.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that First Genesis/Rochester Management Single Family Homes Project in the City of Rochester funded through Monroe County is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the First Genesis/Rochester Management Single Family Homes Project in the City of Rochester funded through Monroe County pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.

3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.



This project will not have a significant adverse impact on the National Register Eligible properties. None of the properties are adjacent to nor directly across the street from the project site.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project is near a potential and unspecified archeologically sensitive site. However, the project site has previously been developed at least as far back as 1888 and will not impact any archeological sensitive sites.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project site is near a environmental remediation site. The Former Wollensack Optical site code C828209 is approximately .7 miles north of the project site. The site classification is C indicating that the DEC has determined that remediation has been satisfactorily completed under a remedial program. The site will not be disturbed and will have no impact on the project site due to their location and remediation classification.

The surrounding area is currently zoned residential in accordance with the City's existing Comprehensive Plan. The existing land is vacant. Surrounding parcels are residential with single family homes. Accordingly, the development of new single family homes on existing residentially zoned parcels will not alter the character, intensity, environment, traffic levels, or other important historic, archaeological, or aesthetic resources. Therefore, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.



The project is approximately 360 feet north of 368-372 Hudson Ave and 350 feet south of 168 Weeger Street which are listed as eligible properties on the NYS Cultural Resource Information Center (CRIS). This project will not have a significant adverse impact on the National Register Eligible properties. None of the properties are adjacent to nor directly across the street from the project site.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project is near a potential and unspecified archeologically sensitive site. However, the project site has previously been developed at least as far back as 1888 and will not impact any archeological sensitive sites.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the project site is near a environmental remediation site. The Former Wollensack Optical site code C828209 is approximately .7 miles north of the project site. The site classification is C indicating that the DEC has determined that remediation has been satisfactorily completed under a remedial program. The site will not be disturbed and will have no impact on the project site due to their location and remediation classification.

The surrounding area is currently zoned residential in accordance with the City's existing Comprehensive Plan. The existing land is vacant. Surrounding parcels are residential with single family homes. Accordingly, the development of new single family homes on existing residentially zoned parcels will not alter the character, intensity, environment, traffic levels, or other important historic, archaeological, or aesthetic resources. Therefore, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

Authorize Appropriation Transfers, Intermunicipal Agreements, and Grant Contracts Pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize appropriation transfers, intermunicipal agreements, and grant contracts for terms to commence on or after August 15, 2024 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026 pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA").

As this Honorable Body is aware, Monroe County received \$144,080,127 in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds through ARPA. This Honorable Body has previously allocated ARPA funds for a number of projects, including authorizing a series of grant awards pursuant to Resolution 342 of 2022, Resolution 199 of 2023, Resolution 380 of 2023, and Resolution 383 of 2023. I now recommend additional allocations prior to the December 31, 2024 deadline to obligate these funds.

This round of ARPA funding will support the following projects:

- Digital Equity and Inclusion: provide funding to the Monroe County Library System ("MCLS") to support and enhance MCLS's Digital Literacy Navigator program; expand MCLS's mi-fi program throughout the thirty (30) library locations in Monroe County; provide digital literacy training and technology services in libraries, senior centers, and low-income housing developments; and install solar-powered benches with device charging and wi-fi capabilities in areas that lack access to a reliable high-speed broadband connection.
- Monroe County Housing Stability Initiatives
 - Housing Search Navigator and After Care Program: provide critical support to eligible households by helping them navigate the housing search process, secure housing, and receive ongoing after-care services to ensure long-term housing stability.
 - Landlord Incentive Program: increase access to safe, affordable, quality rental housing options for individuals and families experiencing homeless. The program will recruit landlords with available housing units, provide monetary incentives to those that rent safe, affordable, quality housing to low-income households, and make additional resources available to cover costs associated with unpaid rent and repair.
 - Landlord Tenant Mediation Program: provide Landlord/Tenant mediation services to help resolve housing conflicts at the earliest stage and preserve existing landlord/tenant relationships.

- City of Rochester/First Genesis Single-Family Homes: enter into an intermunicipal agreement with the City of Rochester to provide funding for the construction of twenty-two (22) single-family homes in the Upper Falls neighborhood by Rochester Management Inc. (developer) and First Genesis Baptist Church (sponsor). The single family homes will be sold to qualifying residents upon completion.
- Municipal Senior/Youth Congregate Programming: provide funding to municipalities to support youth and senior congregate programming and related equipment.
- Senior/Veteran Services Access Pilot: provide one-stop benefits counseling and support services managed by the Monroe County Office for the Aging and the Monroe County Veterans Service Agency.
- Complex Care Program: increase funding for the Complex Care Program, which was approved by the Legislature in Resolution 336 of 2022 and designed to address the barriers to discharge complex care patients from Monroe County hospitals to skilled nursing facilities. Program eligibility includes patients in the hospital who are medically ready for discharge and are awaiting nursing home placement for at least seven days, and have social and medical barriers.
- MCH Nurse Aid Training Program: support instructors and purchase supplies and equipment to
 expand Monroe Community Hospital's ("MCH") nurse aide training program. This initiative
 would enhance the quality of clinical education, increase capacity of MCH's training program, and
 create a pathway to employment at MCH as a certified nursing assistant.
- Grants to Nonprofits Operating in Qualified Census Tracts: establish a grant program to provide financial support to nonprofits that have been operating in Qualified Census Tracts in Monroe County since at least 2019. Grant awards over \$20,000 will be submitted to the legislature for contract approval in future referrals.

Additionally, I recommend allocations to support Monroe County's ongoing reporting and compliance requirements, subrecipient monitoring, and close-out responsibilities. These additional allocations will support additional County staff time, as well as increase the County's contract with EFPR Group, CPAs, PLLC for professional auditing services, with such services to include monthly reporting to be provided by EFPR concerning its findings, with such reporting to be provided to the County Legislature.

The First Genesis Single-Family Homes Project is an Unlisted Action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). The provisions of SEQRA shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving this action.

The remainder of the contracts and appropriation transfers are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"); (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (21) ("minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment"); (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment"); (27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action"); and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") and are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these services and grant contracts will be available in the Departments of Finance, Public Health, Monroe Community Hospital, and the Monroe County Library System once the appropriation transfers are authorized. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the acceptance and payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367-w of New York Social Services Law ("Section 367-w"). I also recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the amendment of various contracts between Monroe County and vendors who provide contract workers to the County to provide for the payment of bonuses for those contracted workers pursuant to Section 367-w.

As Your Honorable Body is aware, Section 367-w was enacted to provide Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses to health care and mental hygiene workers. Section 367-w provides for a bonus of up to \$1,500 per employee based upon hours worked during a six-month vesting period. Section 367-w sets forth a schedule of five vesting periods from October of 2021 through March of 2024. Employees are eligible for a maximum of \$3,000 during the five vesting periods. Employee eligibility is solely determined by Section 367-w and based upon an employee's job title as set forth by the New York State Department of Health.

Pursuant to Resolutions 309 of 2022, 465 of 2022, 269 of 2023, and 40 of 2024, Your Honorable Body approved payments of bonuses to Monroe County employees for the first, second, third, and fourth vesting periods. In addition to certain Monroe County employees being eligible for the bonus, certain contract workers who are employed on behalf of Monroe County pursuant to a contract with a vendor are also eligible. Under the terms of the bonus program, Monroe County is required to submit claims for those contract workers. The New York State Department of Health allowed employers the opportunity to submit claims on behalf of employees and contract workers for vesting period five, and any other previous vesting period, on or before May 1, 2024.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments from the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w in an amount not to exceed \$200,000.

- Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to make payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments to eligible Monroe County employees pursuant to Section 367-w.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute amendments to the following contract in an amount not to exceed \$3,230 for purposes of making payment of Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonus payments to the following eligible Monroe County contractors:
 - A. Morrison Management Specialists, Inc., an affiliate of Morrison Healthcare, a Division of Compass Group USA, Inc. for food, nutritional and vending service management and operation at Monroe Community Hospital, as authorized by Resolution 415 of 2020, as amended by Resolution 465 of 2022 and Resolution 269 of 2023.
- 4. Amend the 2024 operating budget of Monroe Community Hospital, hospital fund 9012, funds center 6201010000 Administration, in the amount of \$33,661; the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5801010000 Public Health Commissioner, in the amount of \$14,534; the Department of Human Services, general fund 9001, funds center 5701010000 Mental Health Administration, in the amount of \$3,230; funds center 5108020000 Children's Center Child Care, in the amount of \$1,077; the Office of the Sheriff, general fund 9001, funds center 3801010000 Sheriff Administration, in the amount of \$7,536; and funds center 3804090000 Jail Medical, in the amount of \$52,749.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for the Health Care and Mental Hygiene Worker Bonuses is being provided by the State of New York pursuant to Section 367-w. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.


