Re: Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to Support the Housing Access Voucher Program (S72/A1704).

Honorable Legislators:

The City of Rochester and Monroe County are experiencing a growing housing crisis, with rising rates of homelessness and an increasing lack of affordable housing options. In recent years, Rochester has seen a troubling increase in the number of individuals and families experiencing homelessness, with local shelters at capacity and more residents being forced into precarious housing situations. Meanwhile, the availability of affordable housing has not kept pace with demand, leading to housing instability for low-income residents, many of whom are at risk of displacement. Rochester continues to struggle with high rates of poverty, with a significant number of households spending more than a third of their income on housing costs.

New York State has a responsibility to ensure that all residents have access to safe, stable, and affordable housing, particularly as housing costs outstrip wages and social safety nets remain insufficient to meet the needs of vulnerable populations. The Housing Access Voucher Program (HAVP) would provide essential assistance by functioning similarly to the federal Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8) but with broader eligibility and greater flexibility. This would include coverage for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including those who do not qualify for federal assistance.

HAVP would offer ongoing rental assistance to those with extremely low incomes, ensuring that recipients pay no more than 30% of their income toward rent. This approach would significantly reduce housing instability and prevent homelessness. Furthermore, investing in HAVP would not only improve housing security but also reduce costs associated with emergency shelters, healthcare, and other crisis interventions caused by homelessness.

Vouchers are an important tool to address housing affordability. Monroe County should join local governments across the state that are calling on New York State to fund and implement HAVP as a necessary tool to address the housing crisis.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge the State Legislature and Governor to include full funding for the Housing Access Voucher Program in the state budget and to take immediate action to support individuals and families in need of stable housing.

RE: Memorializing Congress and President Trump to Pass The Food Deserts Act

Honorable Legislators,

Families should never have to worry about accessing healthy food within their neighborhoods. Yet, millions of people across the country live in food deserts, communities which lack access to affordable, nutritious food. This issue disproportionately affects low-income neighborhoods and rural areas, where grocery stores are scarce or non-existent.

Food insecurity is one of the most pressing issues facing our communities. In fact, according to the latest *Feeding America Map the Meal Gap* report, Monroe County has one of the highest food insecurity rates in the region, with over 12% of residents, roughly in 8 people, facing hunger.

The Food Deserts Act, H.R. 484, introduced by Representative André Carson, aims to combat this critical issue by establishing a program to provide grants to states to create and support grocery stores in food deserts. The bill specifically targets underserved communities, where individuals face barriers to accessing fresh, healthy food. By providing loans to support the opening and operation of grocery stores, the Food Deserts Act will help bring affordable, nutritious options to those who need them the most.

Further, this bill prioritizes initiatives to create jobs within these communities, promote local sourcing of food, and educate residents about healthy eating habits. The bill encourages partnerships with local organizations which specialize in the technical aspects of running a grocery store, ensuring these new businesses have the resources and expertise needed to thrive.

The Food Deserts Act outlines a thoughtful and comprehensive approach to addressing food insecurity. It provides not only financial assistance to establish new grocery stores but also ensures these stores focus on offering unprocessed, nutrient-rich foods and staple items at affordable prices. This legislation empowers states to administer the revolving funds, giving them the flexibility to meet the unique needs of their communities.

By investing in the infrastructure of underserved communities, this bill will help break the cycle of food insecurity and poor health outcomes. The Food Deserts Act has the potential to transform lives by ensuring all Americans, no matter where they live, have access to the food they need to lead healthier, more fulfilling lives.

We strongly urge the members of the House of Representatives and the Senate to support this bill and take action to fight hunger. We also encourage President Trump to sign this bill into law.



Re: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to reintroduce and pass, and the Governor to sign A.3506/S.2235, also known as the New York for All Act

Honorable Legislators:

The New York for All Act (A.3506 / S.2235) would prohibit and regulate the discovery and disclosure of immigration status by New York State and local government entities.

Immigrants are integral to the fabric of communities across New York State, including here in Monroe County. They are our neighbors, coworkers, caregivers, and small business owners. Immigrants make up nearly a quarter of the state's population and contribute billions in taxes and economic activity every year.

New York has made important strides in protecting the rights and dignity of immigrant residents, including expanding access to driver's licenses, tuition assistance, and legal defense. However, gaps in state and local policies continue to leave immigrant New Yorkers vulnerable to federal immigration enforcement through unnecessary collection and disclosure of immigration status.

Policies which allow state and local agencies to share this information not only place individuals at risk of detention and deportation—they also undermine public safety. When immigrant residents fear interactions with local law enforcement or government officials, they are less likely to report crimes, seek assistance, or access critical services. Research shows communities with policies limiting cooperation with ICE experience *lower* crime rates and *stronger* economic outcomes.

The New York for All Act would establish consistent, statewide standards to prevent entanglement with federal immigration enforcement. Specifically, the bill would:

- Prohibit state and local agencies from inquiring about or disclosing a person's immigration status unless required by law;
- Require transparency and reporting of all communications between state/local entities and federal immigration enforcement;
- Bar ICE from entering non-public areas of government property without a judicial warrant;

• Ensure individuals held in local jails are informed of their rights, including the right to decline ICE interviews and the right to legal counsel.

Immigrant New Yorkers deserve to be treated with dignity and equal protection under the law-regardless of which agency or jurisdiction they encounter. Passage of the New York for All Act would make New York a leader in protecting immigrant communities and strengthening trust between government and the people it serves.

We respectfully urge the Legislature to pass—and the Governor to sign—this vital legislation.

Subject: Resolution for Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Nomination and Corridor Management Plan Adoption

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that this Honorable Body adopt a resolution supporting the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, confirming that Monroe County will not approve any requests for new off-premise outdoor advertising signs along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route, and committing to work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to support future Byway program development.

The proposed 550-mile Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway ("Byway") begins at the New Jersey border in the Southern Region and travels through twenty-two counties, before concluding at Niagara Falls. Within Monroe County, the Byway route follows Route 31, except for a segment that travels down East and West Main Street in the City of Rochester.

The Byway serves to commemorate Harriet Tubman's historical impact, and will further enrich Monroe County as a destination for heritage tourism. In adopting the proposed resolution, the County would signal its commitment to protecting, preserving, and promoting the unique resources along the route.

The specific legislative action required is to adopt a resolution supporting the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, confirming that Monroe County will not approve any requests for new off-premise outdoor advertising signs along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route, and committing to work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to support future Byway program development.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

The required action is revenue neutral and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by this Honorable Body.

RESOLUTION FOR HARRIET TUBMAN UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NEW YORK SCENIC BYWAY NOMINATION AND CORRIDOR MANAGEMENT PLAN ADOPTION

WHEREAS, the historic qualities of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, as described in the corridor management plan, and the surrounding areas have been appreciated and celebrated for over a century by the residents of New York State, as well as tourists, historians, artists, authors, and other visitors to the region; and it is this unique combination of the journeys of Harriet Tubman and those Freedom Seekers who traveled on the Underground Railroad that create the special sense of place that is vital in telling the New York story of the human desire for freedom and the historic sites they created during their journey to emancipation; and

WHEREAS, the Steering Committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, composed of representatives of 22 municipalities along the proposed scenic byway route, committed to work cooperatively to protect and promote the historic, scenic, recreational, and economic well-being of the 544-mile Corridor throughout the state and agreed to pursue the nomination of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Steering Committee, each of the 22 counties contributed to the development of this corridor management plan by forming local byway groups, encouraging public participation, and leading individual meetings of the Collaborative; and

WHEREAS, the Advisory Committee of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway, consisting of relatives of Harriet Tubman, descendants of Freedom Seekers, Harriet Tubman and/or Underground Railroad historians, representatives from state and federal agencies has strengthened the historic integrity, representation, and the principles of the corridor management plan; and

WHEREAS, in the process of developing this corridor management plan, the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway Steering Committee has strengthened the bonds of intermunicipal cooperation, and the involved entities envision further benefit through scenic byway designation including sustained collaborative progress, increased funding opportunities for recommendations identified in the plan, enhanced partnerships with agencies responsible for the stewardship of resources along and adjacent to the byway route, and an improved transportation experience that preserves, interprets, and promotes the corridor's intrinsic qualities and resources; and


BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

- Section 1. The County of Monroe supports the designation of the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway which includes programs for stewardship and enhancement of the scenic byway and guidance to manage future activities along its corridor.
- Section 2. The County of Monroe confirms that they will not approve any requests for new offpremise outdoor advertising signs along the designated Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway route.
- Section 3. The County of Monroe will work in partnership with the other municipalities along the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad New York Scenic Byway and local and regional stakeholders in order to support future Byway program development and collaborate with these interested entities to explore opportunities for cooperation and methods to advance the Scenic Byway.

Section 4. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter.

Memorializing New York State Governor Kathy Hochul to Immediately

Rescind Executive Order 47.3 and Ensure All State Prisoners Awaiting

Transfer Are Transferred into the State Prison System

Honorable Legislators:

Over the past several months, New York State Corrections Officers have raised the alarm about unsafe working conditions, chronic understaffing, and excessive mandatory overtime conditions exacerbated by the implementation of the so-called HALT Act. These officers exercised their right to protest, demanding safer conditions and basic respect for the risks they take every day.

Instead of addressing these legitimate concerns, Governor Kathy Hochul chose retaliation over responsibility. Through Executive Order 47.3, she terminated over 2,000 Corrections Officers and banned them from future employment in the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS), stripped their peace officer certification, and prohibited them from serving in any local government role across the State. This extreme and punitive action targeted the very individuals who risk their lives to uphold public safety, sending a dangerous message: stand up for yourself, and you'll be silenced.

Even more disturbing is the fact that these officers were not only fired but effectively blacklisted from public service. By removing their state-issued peace officer certification, the Governor ensured that these men and women—many of whom have spent their careers serving with honor—are barred from continuing their public safety careers at the local level. This vindictive move goes beyond punishment; it's career destruction, carried out without due process, with the clear intent to ruin livelihoods and silence dissent. No state that values law and order should ever treat its public safety personnel this way. Their peace officer certification must be reinstated immediately so that these trained professionals can continue protecting their communities.

Rather than fix the staffing crisis she created, Governor Hochul's administration is now advancing policies to release prisoners early—further jeopardizing public safety and eroding the public's trust in our criminal justice system.

At the same time, Counties like Monroe are being financially punished. State law requires the transfer of sentenced inmates to state prison within ten days. After that, the State reimburses Counties only \$100 per inmate per day. Yet the actual cost of housing a state inmate in Monroe County Jail exceeds \$219 per day, placing an unfair burden on local taxpayers—amounting to thousands in added daily costs and over \$15,000 every single week due to the State's failure to meet its obligations.

This Executive Order has only made a bad situation worse. It has destabilized our correctional system, endangered officers still on the job, and increased pressure on County jails and budgets across New York. Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul to immediately rescind Executive Order 47.3 in its entirety, reinstate the peace officer certification of all affected personnel, and direct the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision to resume the prompt transfer of all State prisoners into the custody of the State prison system.

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Subject: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy

Hochul to Sign Senate Bill S591A, "Relates to Eligible Purchases by School Breakfast and Lunch Service Programs Receiving Additional State Subsidies"

Honorable Legislators:

Strong schools and strong farms are at the heart of strong communities. Senate Bill S591A recognizes that local partnerships between schools and farmers benefit not only students and educators, but also the hardworking families who feed New York State. This legislation takes a common-sense, fiscally responsible step by expanding an existing reimbursement program—already in place for school lunches—to include eligible food purchases made for breakfast and snack programs.

First established in 2018, this reimbursement program was designed to encourage schools to purchase fresh, minimally processed foods from local New York farms. However, the program has been unnecessarily limited—only counting lunch toward the 30% local sourcing threshold, and leaving out items served at breakfast or as snacks, such as milk, yogurt, cheese, and fresh fruits. As a result, only 49 of New York's 686 public school districts qualified, and just seven received reimbursement—an unacceptable return on investment for a program with such promise.

Senate Bill S591A would make simple, smart updates to this underutilized program. It proposes a \$10 million appropriation through the State Education Budget and allows schools to count locally sourced breakfast and snack purchases toward the 30% threshold. This isn't about expanding bureaucracy or creating new entitlements—it's about making an existing program work better for the communities it was meant to serve.

According to Hunger Solutions New York, 4,912 schools in the state operate lunch programs, serving over one million students. Additionally, 1,562 schools serve free breakfast to over 500,000 children. By modernizing the local sourcing incentives to reflect these realities, we can ensure that taxpayer dollars support New York farms, not out-of-state distributors.

Here in Monroe County, our 21 public school districts include both suburban and rural communities that depend on local food systems. Many already work directly with area farms to provide fresh, healthy products to students, but they do so while balancing tight budgets. S591A empowers local school leaders to continue these efforts by easing outdated restrictions—not by increasing spending without accountability.

Therefore, I urge you to join me in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Senate Bill S591A. This bill protects taxpayer dollars, supports small farms, strengthens school nutrition programs, and gives local school districts the flexibility to make smart, community-focused choices.

Honorable Legislators:

Senate Bill S2068, titled "Relates to a Real Property Tax Exemption for Property Owned by Certain Persons Performing Active Duty in a Combat Zone," seeks to provide essential financial relief to active-duty military personnel, acknowledging their unwavering service and sacrifices for our nation. Currently, while veterans benefit from property tax exemptions, active-duty service members do not receive similar benefits, despite their ongoing commitment to national defense. This bill addresses this disparity by offering a 15% exemption on the assessed value of their primary residence, with an additional 10% exemption for those deployed in combat zones, thereby easing the financial burdens associated with homeownership for these dedicated individuals.

The unpredictable nature of military life presents unique economic challenges for service members and their families, often complicating homeownership. By reducing property tax obligations, this legislation would make homeownership more attainable and sustainable for active-duty personnel stationed in New York, providing tangible support that reflects their dedication and service.

Moreover, this bill has the potential to encourage military personnel to establish long-term residency in New York, thereby strengthening local communities. Service members frequently face decisions about where to reside post-service. By offering property tax exemptions, New York positions itself as an attractive option for these individuals and their families, fostering community stability and contributing positively to local economies. Aligning this benefit with existing exemptions for veterans ensures a fair and consistent approach in the state's support for all who serve.

In essence, Bill S2068 acknowledges the sacrifices of active-duty service members by extending financial relief through property tax exemptions. It fills a critical gap in current support structures by including those actively serving, particularly those deployed in combat zones. This measure not only bolsters the financial well-being of military families but also promotes long-term residency in New York, all without imposing undue financial strain on the state. Passing this legislation would be a clear demonstration of New York's commitment to honoring and supporting the men and women who dedicate their lives to protecting our nation.

Therefore, I urge you to join me in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign, Bill S2068 as a sincere expression of gratitude to active-duty service members who risk their lives for our country.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the sale of County owned tax foreclosure property in the Town of Gates may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). This action is described as follows:

The sale of County owned tax foreclosure property located at 763 Howard Road, Rochester, NY 14624 in the Town of Gates has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted action. The SEQRA regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the sale of County owned tax foreclosure property located at 763 Howard Road, Rochester, NY 14624 in the Town of Gates is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the sale of County owned tax foreclosure property located 763 Howard Road, Rochester, NY 14624 in the Town of Gates pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.

3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a Municipal Waste Reduction and Recycling ("MWRR") Grant-In-Aid from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation "(NYSDEC"), in the amount of \$28,600 under the MWRR Capital Projects State Assistance Program to reimburse Monroe County for costs associated with the Expanded Polystyrene ("EPS") Densifier at the Waste Management/Monroe County ecopark located at 10 Avion Drive in the Town of Chili.

The MWRR Capital Projects State Assistance Program is available to counties to provide up to a 50 percent match of eligible costs for capital projects that enhance municipal recycling infrastructure. In 2018, the EPS Densifier was procured and installed at the ecopark. The EPS Densifier allows residents to bring clean, white packing foam to the ecopark to be recycled. In 2019, Monroe County applied for the MWRR Grant-In-Aid to reimburse the County for costs associated with the EPS Densifier. In February 2025, the NYSDEC notified the County that a grant award had been made.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$28,600 Municipal Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant-In-Aid from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation under the Municipal Waste Reduction and Recycling Capital Projects State Assistance Program for costs associated with the Expanded Polystyrene Densifier at the Waste Management/Monroe County ecopark located at 10 Avion Drive in the Town of Chili.

Soil and Water Conservation District

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District in the amount of \$137,200 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the Water Quality Program and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the completion of water quality projects.

The purpose of this grant is to assist counties that are members of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance ("FL-LOWPA") in funding programs to improve water quality. Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District is the sponsor organization for FL-LOWPA, responsible for the administration of this grant. In Monroe County, program components will include planning, education, and implementation of individual projects to improve water quality. The grant will be used to undertake water quality programs including the United States Geological Survey Cooperative Agreement for stream monitoring, public education of invasive species, and stream bank erosion repair projects. The County has received this program specific grant for nearly three decades. This year's funding represents an increase of \$30,000 from last year.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District will provide stormwater management consulting and project management services to identify and implement water quality improvement projects, such as stream bank erosion and shoreline stabilization, in Monroe County and serve as the program manager for the New York State Watercraft Steward Program to control invasive species in Monroe County.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$137,200 grant from, and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Water Quality Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$137,200 into pure waters fund 9307, funds center 8572020100, Office of Environmental Quality.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, 145 Paul Road, Building 5, Rochester, New York 14624, for the completion of water quality projects, in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District is a not-for-profit agency, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the approved schools, agencies and individuals listed in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program (Preschool Program) for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

The Preschool Program is a federally mandated program through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Monroe County is required by New York State to administer the Preschool Program to children, age three to five, who are eligible for special education services. The County fulfills this responsibility by contracting with a variety of eligible, State-approved, Preschool Program providers for evaluations, consultations, education and related services. The Preschool Program providers, who deliver Special Education Classrooms, Evaluations and Special Education Itinerant Services, submit an application and go through an approval process with the New York State Education Department. Based on the most recent school year with completed data (2023-2024), the Preschool Program served 3521 Monroe County children.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the approved schools, agencies and individuals specified in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually, for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these contracts is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds centers 5807510000, PSE Tuition & SEIT, 5807520000, PSE Related Services and 5807530000, PSE Preschool Evaluations, and will be requested in future years' budgets. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies or individuals owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

of Health for Support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 324 of 2024, to accept additional funding from New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$842,935 for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program.

The purpose of this grant is to provide support of the County's existing Nurse-Family Partnership ("NFP") program. The NFP program is an evidence-based nurse home visiting program that has been rigorously evaluated and includes expertly trained nurses delivering the services per a standard curriculum. The grant will provide a portion of the funding for the NFP program annually providing home visits to up to 300 high-risk, first time mothers, their infants and families to improve their pregnancy outcomes and their health, well-being and self-sufficiency. Funds will be used for partial salary and benefits of existing positions, administrative costs, training, printing, purchase of supplies to run the program, and vendor contracts. This is the seventh year the County has received this grant.

Funds will also be used to contract with UR Medicine Home Care, Licensed Services, Inc. dba Visiting Nurse Signature Care to provide the nurses who make home visits to all NFP clients, and for administrative support in arranging for travel, accommodations and training for the program.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 324 of 2024 to accept an additional \$842,935 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health, for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program, bringing the total program award to \$5,700,775.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$337,174 into general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Department of Health. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Mental Health ("NYSOMH") and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports in the total amount of \$303,361 for the Court Navigator Program, and amend Resolution 427 of 2024 to authorize contracts for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2025 and increase the contracts from an amount not to exceed \$51,475,417 to an amount not to exceed \$51,778,778 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. An updated Attachment A is attached reflecting the additional Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services to be provided through contracts with the County and the vendors selected for the provision of those services.

The additional funding will provide for the services of Court-Based Mental Health Navigators pursuant to a previously authorized contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. This funding is expected to cover salaries, fringe benefits, administrative expenses, and program oversight.

Additional services and vendors identified in the updated Attachment A include the Incentive Stipend Program, the Youth Peer Mentoring Program, the Skill Building Program, the Homeless Support Service Program, the Senior Screening Program, and the Re-entry Program. Request for Proposals were issued for these services, with Housing Options Made Easy, Inc. D/B/A Recovery Options Made Easy, Compeer Rochester, Inc., Lifespan of Greater Rochester, Inc., House of Mercy, Inc., East House Corporation, YWCA of Rochester and Monroe County, and Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. selected as the most qualified vendors to provide these services. These selected vendors and the services to be provided are set forth in greater detail in the updated Attachment A.

Please refer to the attached Purchase of Services Information Forms for disclosure of information required pursuant to Resolution 223 of 2007, as amended by Resolution 11 of 2008.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 129 of 2024 to accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services in the amount of \$2,345,967 for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender, the Office of the Monroe County Conflict Defender and the Assigned Counsel Program, for the provision of indigent legal services, for the period of April 1, 2024 through March 31, 2027.

The additional award will be used for the Office of the Public Defender to increase funding for specialized services, rent and relocation, computers and furniture along with the creation of one (1) Senior Project Manager and for existing personnel, contractual and specialized services, CLE trainings, rent, supplies, legal research materials, professional licenses, travel, computer and database expenses in the Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office and the Assigned Counsel Program. This additional funding will also fund the Felony Conflict Plan in the Assigned Counsel Program. Over the three (3) year period, the funding amounts for the Office of the Monroe County Public Defender increased from \$26,089,122 to \$27,654,470; the Office of the Monroe County Conflict Defender increased from \$6,681,672 to \$7,082,572; and the Assigned Counsel Program increased from \$6,328,656 to \$6,708,375. This additional funding will bring the grant total to \$41,445,417.

- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to create one (1) Senior Project Manager, Group 17, in the Public Defender's Office as part of the amended 2nd Statewide Expansion of the Hurrell-Harring Program grant.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the conveyance of a temporary environmental conservation easement to the Town of Penfield on the property located at 1775 Kennedy Road, Penfield, New York, Tax ID: 111.01-1-27 ("Property") for forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

The County originally purchased the 76-acre Property in 2015 to provide a buffer to adjacent lands that were the site of the former Gloria Drive Landfill. Your Honorable Body authorized the purchase of the Property by Resolution 239 of 2015.

Monroe County (Grantor) intends to convey to the Town of Penfield (Grantee) the right to preserve and protect the Property for the duration of the easement. With this easement, the County and the Town seek to retain the Property in its natural condition and to prevent any use of the Property that could impact the conservation value of the Property. The term of this easement shall be forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to convey a temporary environmental conservation easement to the Town of Penfield on the property located at 1775 Kennedy Road, Penfield, New York, Tax ID: 111.01-1-27 for forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

This action is a type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(39) ("an agency's acquisition and dedication of 25 acres or less of land for parkland, or dedication of land for parkland that was previously acquired, or acquisition of a conservation easement;") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This conveyance will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Monroe County Elections Commissioners Jackie Ortiz and Peter D. Elder.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" from \$0 to \$2,000,000, and to decrease funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Voting Equipment," from \$2,000,000 to \$0, and authorize interfund transfers.

The \$2 million reallocation for voting machine replacement is necessary to address critical logistical challenges and comply with updated voter capacity requirements. Initially allocated for electronic pollbooks, these funds are now needed to purchase additional ES&S voting machines, ensuring a seamless transition between early voting and Election Day without transferring machines between locations.

The original allocation was based on a registered voter count of 480,000, but following the Presidential Election, that number has exceeded 500,000, requiring an increase in machines at select polling sites. Furthermore, machine allocation must be calculated at the poll site level, meaning additional voting machines are required at certain locations to meet demand.

Additionally, per NYS BOE Resolution 23-27, a single ExpressVote XL machine cannot serve more than 450 voters, with additional machines at the same site limited to 550 voters each, further necessitating this reallocation.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" by \$2,000,000, from \$0 to \$2,000,000, for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.

- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "Voting Equipment" by \$2,000,000, from \$2,000,000 to \$0, for a total project authorization of \$0.
- 3. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$2,000,000 from capital fund 2124, Voting Equipment, to capital fund 1996, Replacement of Voting Equipment.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These amendments to the capital budget and interfund transfers will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a local law entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County." This Local Law would assist our District Attorney's Office, Law Department, Public Defender's Office, and Conflict Defender's Office in attracting and retaining qualified candidates for attorney positions.

Our Monroe County legal offices have all experienced losing attorney staff to other counties, or being unable to recruit qualified candidates due to our residency requirement. Our neighboring counties generally do not require attorney staff to live within the county in which they serve. This Local Law would allow Monroe County to attract a broader pool of applicants and remain competitive with neighboring counties by permitting attorneys employed by the County to reside in either Monroe County or an adjoining county, while still ensuring that senior leadership positions in each of the County legal offices are required to reside in Monroe County.

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2. Enact a Local Law entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County."

ENACT A LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR ATTORNEYS EMPLOYED BY MONROE COUNTY"
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:
Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 392 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County" and shall read as follows:
§ 1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:
COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.
ATTORNEY shall mean an individual employed by Monroe County as an Assistant District Attorney, a Deputy County Attorney, an Assistant Public Defender, or an Assistant Conflict Defender, provided however that for purposes of this Chapter it shall not mean anyone in a position in Pay Group 22 or above.
Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or in which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from being employed as an Attorney by the County, provided that such person resides in the County or any adjoining county within New York State.
Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
Section 3. This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

The specific legislative action required is to incorporate by reference and adopt the attached resolution required by New York State to allow Monroe County to install license plate reader equipment and technology for an Automatic License Plate Reader Program within Monroe County and in right-of-way owned by the State of New York as described in the attached listing of locations.

Acceptance of a Grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice

Services for the 2024 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program

(Monroe County Crime Lab)

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$58,159 for the 2024 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program for the period of February 1, 2025 through January 31, 2026.

This program provides funding for the Monroe County Crime Laboratory to fund accreditation expenses, supplies and travel for training which will improve the quality and timeliness of forensic services. This is the twenty-third year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$726 from last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$58,159 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the 2024 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program (Monroe County Crime Lab) for the period of February 1, 2025 through January 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Monroe County Department of Public Safety by appropriating the sum of \$58,159 into general fund 9300, funds center 2408040100, Monroe County Crime Laboratory.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5 (c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Re: Memorializing Affirmation of Constitutional Principles


Honorable Legislators:

We are living in unprecedented and uncertain times. Across the country, we are witnessing widespread constitutional, statutory, and human rights violations happening every day. Our nation is entering dangerous territory – and local governments must respond. As home to Rochester, the city of Frederick Douglass and Susan B. Anthony, Monroe County has a long and proud tradition of standing up for the civil liberties and human rights which must be the backbone of a free society.

Memorializing an affirmation of constitutional principles is a statement of values which affirms our commitment to human dignity, fairness, and equal protection under the law for all persons, regardless of race, sex, religion, national origin, immigration status, or political views. Those same values are embodied throughout the United States Constitution. Notably, the Fourteenth Amendment forbids governmental actors from "depriv[ing] any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law" and from "deny[ing] to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws." This action imposes no legal restrictions on the Monroe County Departments, but instead, reflects a moral and policy stance in the face of increasingly aggressive and constitutionally infirm federal immigration enforcement tactics.

Immigrants – including those with legal status and asylum seekers who avail themselves of the legal process established by Congress – are being detained without charges, denied access to legal counsel, and in some cases, deported to third-party countries without due process. Students, workers, and families are being "disappeared" from communities like ours under the guise of federal immigration enforcement. Judges who uphold the Constitution are being openly threatened with impeachment by political leaders at the highest level of government, and federal officials have indicated they may ignore judicial rulings altogether – in stark violation of sacrosanct separation of powers principles fundamental to our constitutional order.

Monroe County must take a stand. Affirming our support for Constitutional Principles explicitly reaffirms our commitment to due process, equal protection under law, access to legal counsel, freedom of speech, and the right to live free from fear of unlawful detention or discrimination.



This is not about shielding criminals. We all agree individuals convicted of serious crimes should face appropriate consequences. This is about protecting families, students, workers, and vulnerable people who are being swept up in a system that no longer resembles justice.

At a time when our federal institutions are failing to uphold basic human, civil, and constitutional rights, Monroe County has an opportunity – and a responsibility – to lead and stand on the side of such dearly-held constitutional principles as freedom of speech, petition and assembly, due process of law, equal protection under law, and the separation of powers.
