# 100 DEADLIEST DAYS



Monroe County STOP-DWI Coordinator, Lindsay Tomidy, joined law enforcement and AAA at a press conference to discuss the start of the "100 Deadliest Days" in Monroe County.

The "100 Deadliest Days" is the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day when fatal teen crashes increase dramatically.

AAA coined the phrase after examining troubling data regarding fatal crashes among teen drivers. Nationwide, 6,697 people died in teen driver-related summertime crashes over a ten-year period from 2013 to 2022. That is nearly half of the total number of those killed in teen-driver crashes for the entire rest of the year in that span. In 2022 alone, 707 people were killed in such deadly crashes. The 2022 figure is a 10 percent increase over pre-pandemic figures from 2019.

In New York State, 13 people were killed in crashes involving teen drivers in summer of 2022. And 151 people were killed in teen driver crashes during the "100 Deadliest Days" over the ten-year span from 2013 to 2022. 151 people killed during summer months over the ten-year span equates to a summertime average of 15 deaths. It's a dramatic increase from 274 people killed over the course of nine non-summer months over the ten-year period.


"Young drivers in high school and college look forward to the summer season and await newfound freedom with a break from school," said Mike Formanowicz, driver training manager at AAA Western and Central New York. "AAA urges parents to talk to their young drivers about traffic safety and serve as good role models as well. Putting the phone down behind the wheel is a great example."

Due to their inexperience, teen drivers are at a higher risk of crashes.

According to AAA, various factors, such as driving with passengers, significantly impact road safety. Teen drivers are particularly vulnerable to increased crash risks when accompanied by other teen Risks can be further passengers. compounded by driving at night s due to reduced visibility, driver fatique. and the presence of impaired individuals on the road. It is crucial to acknowledge that excessive speed plays a pivotal role in crashes involving both teenagers and adults. Teenage drivers must adhere to designated speed limits, while parents should lead by example and coach young drivers on adjusting speed for weather, conditions. road and traffic. Numerous teens acknowledge engaging with their mobile phones and in-car infotainment systems while driving, despite the evident risks involved. It is recommended parents set limits and enforce rules to prevent distractions.

Adolescents frequently encounter challenges in obtaining sufficient sleep, leading to difficulties with drowsiness. It is vital to acknowledge that drowsy driving poses a comparable hazard to driving under the influence of alcohol, with teenagers being particularly vulnerable to this risk. Prioritizing adequate rest for all drivers is imperative to promote road safety. These statistics were sourced from the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research (ITSMR). In a significant move to ensure the safety of students, Greece CSD, Monroe County's second largest school district has joined Hilton CSD, East Irondequoit CSD, Webster CSD and BOCES 1 in partnering with BusPatrol and Monroe County Department of Public Safety (DPS) to employ the use of cameras to deter drivers from passing buses that are loading and unloading students.




Monroe County hopes that expanded participation will continue to shift driver behavior and enhance awareness of the importance of safe driving around school buses. DPS School Bus Video Specialists continue to see many drivers who exercise caution, slow down, and stop for school buses. We thank these drivers for their awareness and attempt to create a safe environment for our children to enter and exit the bus.

While many drivers do their part to protect our children, some drivers try to "beat the reds." This is the practice of accelerating past a slowing or stopped school bus that has flashing amber lights, in an effort to pass the bus before the red lights activate and the stop-arms (side-mounted stop signs) extend. This practice not only endangers the children entering or exiting the bus, it also jeopardizes the safety of those who have safely slowed or stopped in anticipation of the school bus stop.

Do not try to beat the reds! It is simply not worth a child's life.

### School Bue Safety. Know When to Stop!





As a reminder, all traffic near a loading/unloading school bus must stop. Traffic on the same roadway must stop regardless of direction of travel. Registered owners of vehicles that illegally pass a stopped school bus in a participating school district will receive a citation by mail. The citation fine starts at \$250 and is collected by Bus Patrol.






